South Pointe Preschool News

With Winter in full swing, it's the perfect time to encourage cooperation and prosocial skills while keeping children active. Physical activity during the winter months not only supports their physical development but also offers opportunities to practice teamwork, sharing, and problem-solving. All of our preschool children LOVE exploring the snow, and it is where we often see children taking part in **cooperative play**.

Cooperative play in a preschool setting is when children work together to achieve a common goal. This type of play helps children develop essential social skills like sharing, taking turns, and solving problems together. For example, one of their favorite winter activities is pulling each other on sleds. Through this, children learn to take turns—one child pulls while the other enjoys the ride, and then they switch. They practice patience, sharing, and supporting each other in a fun and meaningful way.

When building snow forts and pathways, the children engage in cooperative play by dividing up tasks like shoveling, packing snow, and adding design elements. They negotiate roles, communicate their ideas, and help each other out, all while working toward a shared goal. These moments of collaboration teach children how to solve problems together, support one another, and share responsibilities.

Even in quieter moments, like making snow angels or hopping through the snow, the children show kindness by offering help, encouraging each other, or taking turns. These small acts of empathy and support are key aspects of cooperative play, fostering an environment where children develop strong social connections and learn the value of caring for others.

Winter outdoor play provides an abundance of opportunities for cooperative play, where children strengthen friendships and develop prosocial skills, all while staying active and having fun in the snow!

Thank you to families who were able to join us for our parent event last month. The children all seemed to enjoy the crafts and snacks. The family pictures taken in front of Ian's wonderful winter scene will be put in a special book for the children to enjoy.

The children have enjoyed pulling each other on the sleds outside. Besides building muscles and a great aerobic activity, it teaches children about motion and friction. Children are learning what makes the slide go fast, what slows it down, why the slide is easier to pull on the snow instead of the concrete. There are positive interactions as children trade positions to be the rider or the puller. When we take children to the Montrose hill, children learn about distance and risk taking. We always have an educator at the top to ensure the hill is clear, and one educator at the bottom to ensure children are walking up the side away from where others are sliding.

There were opportunities for the preschool children to play with the older school age children during the winter break. They played out in the yard and had a cultural dance party together. These engaging and enjoyable interactions will provide a strong foundation, helping our preschoolers smoothly transition as they move into the school-age years.

Preschool News:

After a busy month of re-establishing the newly formed Eagles and Bisons groups, the preschool educators have been focusing on devel oping a routine and curriculum that suits the needs and interests of children. Through the Forest and Nature lens, the Bisons and Eagles have disc ove red a I ove of natural mate rials, and we have encouraged this play by bring ing outside in! Within our Forest and Nature programming, one element that we highlight with the children is the Seven Grandfathe r/Sacred Teachings of the First Nations people. While the re are varieties of the teachings within diffe rent Indi genous messages are similar. Star ting with the Bison, who brings us the nations, the teaching of respect, foll owed by Sabe, the teacher of honesty, and most recently the Bear who teaches us courage. To show respect to the Land, we beg in each Forest and Nature experience with our Land Acknowledgement, created by our Anti-Bias group who is made up a dedicated team of educators who devel oped the language that we use to honour those people who lived on the land before us.

The beg innings of a curriculum have star ted in bo th rooms, with the Bisons expl oring sensory play with a dinosaur twist and the Eagles also star ted on a sensory play focus which has shifted to a dramatic play curriculum about construction workers! I wonder where they go to that idea?!

We are I ooking forward to the opening of our new Preschool Program at Prairie Roo ts very soon!

School Age News:

The school age program has taken advantage of the mild weather and have taken the opportunity to spend more time outdoors, even planning an outdoor field trip to Woodhaven Park for tobogganing over Winter Break. On the colder days, the groups have been showing off their creative talents and interests indoors, not just with music but also with literacy. A few of the groups have been engaging in character development and playmaking for role play games and theatre performances.

After finally getting our gym back, the older groups have reclaimed their space and are making great use of it! Recognizing the need for movement, especially during these cold snaps, the educators have created two spaces within one room. One side for large gross motor play and the other side for quiet activities, which has been a welcome idea for those children. Our younger groups have been busy crafting and exploring with loose parts. Loose parts are any and everything you can imagine that can be upcycled to create something new. The idea behind loose parts is that they are meant to be used over and over without any kind of fasteners or glue. It allows the children to explore open-ended play in whatever creative way they can think of as many times as they want.
