From Karen's Desk

Another year has come and gone and provincial government is holding our revenue the same with no increase. Our expenses such as employee cost and benefits, program and food, rent, etc., all go up but we have no new revenue to pay for them. Our board of directors is constantly reviewing our fixed and discretionary costs. We are likely to have some news for families in the coming months. This year's provincial budget had no new funding and allowed no parent fee increases. We are not like school divisions where we have a tax base and we can make up the difference of funding with the increase. We can charge a regulated maximum daily fee as well as receive an operating fund that has not increased since 2016.

It is already challenging to recruit and retain the fantastic educators we have had the pleasure of working with and this may mean that it will get harder to keep them. We will likely be unable to provide a cost of living increase or any increases to our hard working educators.

We will rely on families to continue to provide loose parts for art supplies and donations of items to support our programs. Tax deductible donations are appreciated. If you have not already done so, families can of make tax deductible donations through their workplaces on payroll deductions which are sometimes matched by employers. The Province of Manitoba in collaboration with United Way can arrange deductions through their All Charities Campaign each year. These funds come directly to K.I.D.S. Inc. Thank you to all families who have arranged this. We will continue to need your support to sustain us through our next "austerity" budget effective July 1, 2019.


Friday the children set up the gym into a large family style dining room. The children were able to serve themselves, help each other, and all sit together to enjoy a meal!
